

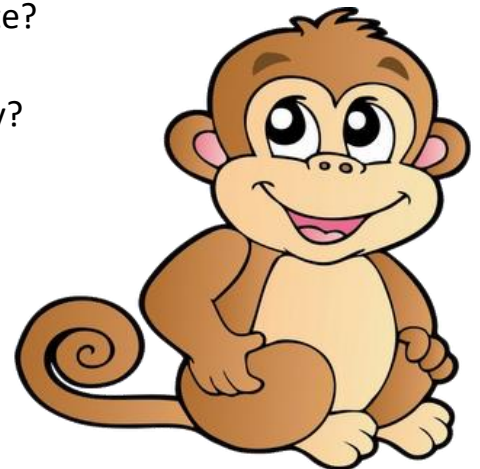
Music Trivia-Week 8 (Grades K-5)

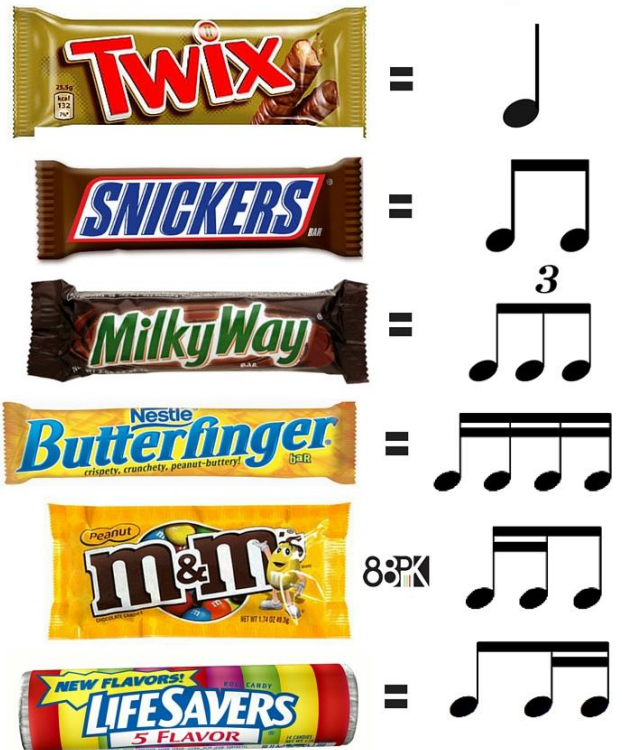
Anybody hungry?
