Chorus:

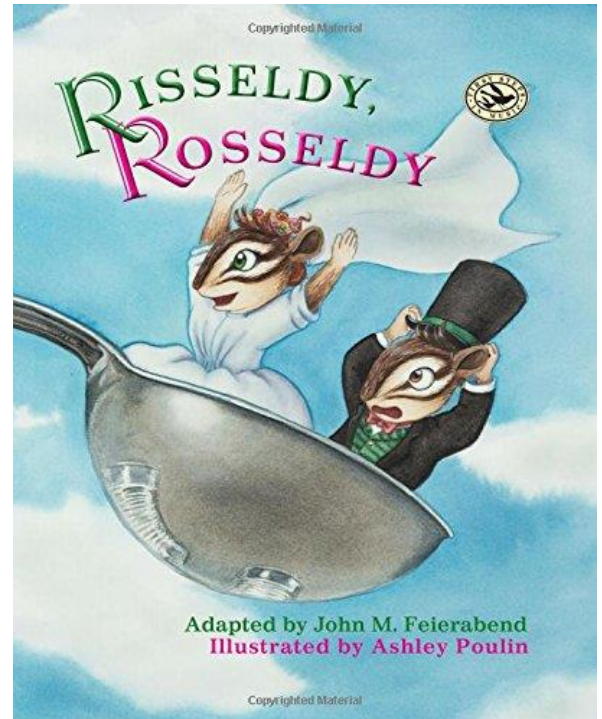
Risseldy, rosseldy, hey bambassity,

You are the donkey. Listen for the high sound of the violin in the music – that is the “hee” of “hee-haw”. Pretend to be a donkey and “hee-haw” along with the music!
